## Proposed response to design elements consultation by HS2 Ltd

Councillors to note that it is proposed that the PC answer only the first 3 questions because they are the ones that apply to rural areas. Berkswell Parish and hence the Balsall Common/& Berkswell Community are defined by HS2 Ltd as rural in this consultation. The remaining 6 questions are merely the same three questions asked again but for urban areas and near transport corridors.

Respondents are asked to rate the importance of the item on a scale of 1 to 5 and then give a commentary.

1. The appearance of structures, including opportunities to add patterns and textures to create a sense of local identity -Importance to us 5

- a. The Berkswell Society is aware that glass noise barriers are widely used on motorways in continental Europe and by the German railways and consider that for special locations, such in Balsall Common, they would significantly improve the visual appeal of bridges/viaducts by reducing "apparent bulk". The common design elements should allow for this possibility at sensitive locations listed in Information paper design policy D1. This desire is partly addressed in the Design case studies (Number 1) requested by the national design panel.
- b. The Berkswell Society has recommended before that HS2 Ltd should seek advice from experts in this field. We have suggested that HS2 Ltd contact one of the leading experts in architectural glass Darren Kearns on 077107 39147. At that time he was employed by Europe's premier glass company Saint-Gobain <a href="www.glassolutions.co.uk">www.glassolutions.co.uk</a> Recently he moved to Hansen a specialist installer of glass systems. His phone number has not changed and it is disappointing that HS2 Ltd have not sought his specialist advice. His phone number is unchanged (as above) and he stands ready and able to provide advice. - c. The maximum opportunity for the use of surface treatments (patterns, textures etc) should be incorporated into the design elements to adapt the surface to the local context. Design should minimise the likelihood of staining of the concrete which so often happens on concrete structures. Designs should enable pebble surfaces, colour, brick, metals such as bronze or stainless steel (not rusting steel) and other things that break the boredom of concrete when seen close up.

## 2. Ways of discouraging vandalism and graffiti, including fencing, security measures and an arts and culture strategy to create a sense of ownership – importance to us 5

- a. Comment Concrete structures and not seen as attractive and encourage vandalism such as spray painting. They are less likely to damage the surfaces if those surfaces are both attractive and built in a way that resists things such as paint. The station building in Berkswell has never been vandalised despite being unmanned in the evening/night. Various surfaces and treatments reduce the risk of vandalism from spray paint. We also think that planting shrubs and small trees could play a part underneath the tall structures that will exist in Balsall Common. Similarly, water features can deter easy access whilst meeting an environmental purpose. Please also see the Berkswell Society's thoughts on the next question relating to the use of soft features which will help avoid vandalism but also create safe spaces
- 3. Creating safe spaces and/or a sense of space under viaducts for example, through lighting, art and culture or community projects importance to us 5
  - a. **Comment** Soft features should be added to the areas underneath viaducts particularly where they are high as in Balsall Common. Vegetation and ponds should be added to this list for rural areas and blend those ecological features back into the surrounding countryside. Vegetation could include native shrubs and bushes typical of the area and in some instances, trees could be used subject to their placement relative to the structure.
